Kay Electric's 2025 Annual Meeting Draws Record Crowd

Nearly 1,200 turn out for the co-op's largest drive-thru event yet

Not even spring showers could dampen the enthusiasm at Kay Electric's 2025 annual meeting. On April 4, members once again turned out in record numbers for the co-op's fourth annual drive-thru event at headquarters in Blackwell.

This year, 1,163 members registered during the event, making it the largest annual meeting turnout in KEC's recent history—just one member short of the all-time attendance record set in 1972.

Stormy skies couldn't cloud the community spirit as members were greeted by Kay Electric staff, board members and Minutemen and Minutewomen volunteers. Kay Electric youth members Balen Grell and Jude Sappenfield also joined in the fun, donning the costume of electric co-op mascot Willie Wiredhand.

Members drove through the co-op grounds for a behind-the-scenes

look at operations—cruising through the yard and the garage, where they picked up a Kay Electric flashlight. The route wrapped up at the pullthrough registration station, where each member cast their vote and received a \$25 cash registration gift.

The annual meeting business session was streamed on Facebook and the Kay Electric website. Board President Max Hohmann presided over the meeting, followed by remarks from CEO Jason Boesch, Secretary/Treasurer Ron Shoffner and Attorney John Ihrig. Longtime volunteers Doug and Radena Eisenhauer closed out the evening by drawing the winners of 27 prize giveaways and five grand prizes.

Now in its 88th year, Kay Electric continues to grow stronger thanks to the participation and support of our members. Thank you to everyone who helped make this year's meeting a standout success!

good Cookin'

Cowboy Caviar

Ingredients

- 15-ounce can sweet corn
- 15-ounce can black beans
- 1 bunch cilantro
- 3 roma tomatoes
- 2 jalapenos
- 1/2 red onion
- 2 bell peppers (mix of colors)
- 1/3 cup olive oil
- 1/3 cup red wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- 1 lime, juiced
- Salt and pepper, to taste

Instructions

Drain and rinse corn and black beans; dry well. Finely chop cilantro, tomatoes, jalapenos, onion and bell peppers. To make dressing, combine olive oil, red wine vinegar, honey, paprika and lime juice. Season with salt and pepper, to taste. Mix vegetables with dressing. Serve with tortilla chips.
