2023 Year in Review CEO Jason Boesch

ow in my fourth year as Chief Executive Officer at Kay Electric, it has been a real honor to have the opportunity. In just this handful of years, I've already seen an energy industry rapidly evolving, with more to come. Utilities like Kay Electric are doing our best to keep pace but do so in a reasonably balanced manner. At least that has been the approach we think is responsible.

The year 2023 signaled a return to normal after the COVID-related challenges of 2020 to 2022. While there are still some lingering effects from the pandemic prevalent throughout society, I am thankful that our most uncertain days are now in the past, allowing us a return to business as usual at Kay Electric. One remnant from COVID which has not left us is supply chain delays and inflated material costs. Our costs for poles, wires and transformers have doubled in this short stretch with no indication of a price retreat. Kay Electric prides itself on an economical, tight-run operation, but inflation to those extremes stretches our budget. Thankfully, these challenges have not impacted our service reliability, and we'll continue to work hard on your behalf to keep your service safe, reliable and affordable.

The power generation market which supplies distribution electric co-ops, such as Kay Electric, continues to see change and challenge. The February 2021 Storm Uri Polar Vortex event was a first-of-its-kind, black swan event at the time; it was quickly followed by an even higher usage event of Storm Elliott in December 2022. Both of those events were then topped again with Storm Gerri in January 2024. The generation market has many evolutions in its future with fossil fuel coal facing pressured retirements, added renewables, and more electric vehicle charging to join the grid.

Kay Electric continued its robust community support by encouraging area high school juniors to participate in the essay contest for a chance to win an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., with Youth Tour or to Steamboat Springs, Colorado, for Leadership Camp. The top eight essays in 2023 were awarded trips or cash prizes. First place went to Christian Widener from Blackwell High School and second place went to Carlene Johnson of Garber High School. Area eighth-graders were also included in an essay competition. Kira Widener, Lillie Lewer, Nyla Evans, and Sydnee Benson were awarded the trip to Hinton, Oklahoma's beautiful Canyon Energy Camp.

The K-UP charitable foundation awarded over \$7,800 in grant funds to area organizations, made available by Kay Electric member and miscellaneous donations. Members can elect to round up their monthly electric bill to the nearest dollar, with the extra funds donated to the K-UP Community Foundation.

At home, our inspection and maintenance programs continue to keep the system strong and reliable. Kay Electric crews logged 312,277 miles in our five-county service

territory to perform maintenance and work service orders. We inspected 5,115 poles in our annual pole inspection program, across our 2,269 miles of line and 50,955 poles, which identified 494 pole deficiencies for correction. Due diligence keeping the system in good order always pays for itself in the long run and keeps the lights on. Your Kay Electric employee workforce remains professional and dependable in serving you and keeping the power flowing.

We look forward to seeing you at Annual Meeting on Friday, April 12. This will again be a drive-thru style event held at the Kay Electric headquarters, 300 West Doolin in Blackwell, due to renovations at Blackwell High School. The trustees and employees at Kay Electric Cooperative thank you for allowing us to be your energy partner.

s a not-for-profit electric cooperative, Kay Electric exists to serve its members. I value the cooperative model because it means working together toward a common goal. The Kay Electric board understands how the decisions we make affect you, the rates you pay, and the quality of service you receive. One of the seven cooperative principles is democratic member control. This separates us from other utility models, because each member has a vote, and members are elected to represent their district on the board of trustees that governs Kay Electric.

KAY ELECTRIC BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Electric Cooperative's service territory is divided into nine voting districts. nine-member board of directors represents consumer-members in each district.

Kay Electric board officers are:

Trustee positions are up for election every three years. In February, Districts 4, 5 and 6 held trustee elections with incumbent Trustees being re-elected. Any member may run for Trustee, according to qualifications listed in the co-op bylaws, Sec. 4.02. Trustees are required to go through a certification process and must stay informed about electric utility issues and trends. 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CAPITAL CREDITS HOW DO THEY WORK?



When KEC's financial conditions permit, the board of directors may decide to retire (pay) capital credits to members.

A BENEFIT OF MEMBERSHIP

Because electric co-ops operate at cost, any excess revenues—called net margins—are returned to members in the form of capital credits.

► KEC's board of directors is committed to retiring capital credits. The allocation and retirement of capital credits is one of the most unique and rewarding benefits of being a Kay Electric member.

Since 2007, KEC's board has used a hybrid, first-in, first-out and a last-in, first-out retirement method so the maximum number of members receive some return of investment. KEC is currently at a rotation of approximately 12 years.

▶ Not all co-ops retire capital credits, and not all co-ops retire capital credits in a way that benefits the most members. It's one aspect of co-op membership that is unique to KEC.



In 2023, commercial sales made up \$17,278,062 of KEC's revenues. Industrial sales accounted for \$15,132,126. Residential sales totaled \$6,876,951. Other sources of revenue and interest made up \$178,637. KEC's total revenues were \$39,465,776.
