Electrical safety tips for spook-tacular Halloween fun

As Halloween approaches, it's time to embrace the season with candy, costumes, and festive decorations. Whether you're lighting up your yard with eerie lights or setting up inflatable ghouls, keeping safety in mind is crucial. Here are some electrical safety tips to ensure your Halloween is both thrilling and safe:

Check Decorations Thoroughly: Before plugging in those spooky lights and animated displays, inspect each item for signs of damage. Look for cracked or frayed cords, exposed wires and damaged plugs, as these can lead to shock or fire. Replace any damaged decorations. Opt for Safety-Approved Decor: Be sure your decorations are approved by a reputable laboratory, like Underwriters Laboratory (UL) for outdoor use.

Avoid Overloading: Don't overload extension cords and keep them away from water. Overloaded cords can overheat and become a fire hazard, 202101

Use Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters:

Plug outdoor lights and decorations into GFCI-protected outlets. These devices can prevent electrical shock by shutting off power when they detect a ground fault. Stay Safe Around Power Lines: When decorating outside, always look up. Keep yourself and any equipment, like ladders, at least 10 feet away from overhead power lines. Carry ladders and long tools horizontally to avoid accidental contact.

Enjoy your Halloween and make sure your spooky setup is as safe as it is spectacular!



GOOD **COOKIN'**

Rice Krispie Pumpkins

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup butter
- 40 large marshmallows
- Red & yellow food coloring
- 6 cups crispy rice cereal
- Oil for greasing hands
- Mini Rolos
- Green M&Ms

Instructions

In a large pot, melt the butter over low heat. Add the marshmallows and stir until melted. Remove from heat. Add yellow food color (about 12 drops), mix, and add red food color, one drop at a time (about 4 drops). Mix well. Add the crispy rice cereal and stir to combine. Grease hands with oil and roll the cereal mixture into small balls. Set on parchment paper. Re-grease hands after each ball. While the balls are still warm, press a mini rolo into the top of each pumpkin for the stem and add a green M&M beside it as the leaf. Cool until firm.

Efficiency Tip of the Month: If you recently made or plan to make energy efficiency improvements to your home, you may be eligible for federal tax credits. The Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) of 2022 empowers homeowners to save money on energy efficiency improvements and upgrades. Homeowners can save up to \$3,000 annually to lower the cost of efficiency upgrades by up to 30%. A few upgrades covered through the IRA include new exterior doors, windows, insulation, heating/cooling equipment and other major appliances. If you completed an upgrade this year or you are considering one, visit www.energystar.gov/federal-tax-credits to learn if you qualify for a tax credit. Source: energystar.gov
